

Our total was 15 grams for the trip. Given that the rain came and all tracks closed (even the bitumen between Tibooburra and Broken Hill was closed for a day), we travelled back down to Broken Hill, then up through Cobar and Bourke to Goondiwindi in Old. It poured rain all the way with horrendous driving conditions. We even saw a three-trailer road train tipped on its side! We made our way to Brisbane to visit relatives and get some warmth and sunshine, then headed home via Lightning Ridge. All








gies felt real sorry for bad day they had but realized that we still have a few more years to go before we can top that. Now this said couple could





# How to find the weight of gold in a specimen

There is 4 ways to determine the weight of gold in a specimen.

- 1; Break up the specimen to release the gold, and pan off the residue. This method is not recommended because it would be crazy to destroy a fine specimen since the value of the gold in the specimen could be worth less than the specimen as a whole, particularly if it of a nice configuration.
- 2; Determine the volume of the specimen by placing it in a measuring jug filled with water and note the water displacement. Now find another rock a bit bigger than the specimen and with the same composition as the host rock that doesn't contain any gold, and chip bits off it until it has the same water displacement as the specimen. Now all you need to do is weigh them separately and the gold weight will be the difference.
- 3; This method requires the calculation of the specific gravity of the specimen. Specific gravity is defined as the ratio between the



Remember to be considerate of others if you feel that you must use a generator

Don't use it close to other campers, take measures to mitigate the sound such as put it in a ditch or use a sound baffle, don't run it all day, and observe the 9:00 pm cut off time

We encourage you to consider charging batteries with a solar panel instead of a generator.

- mass of the material and the mass of the same volume of water. Specific gravity of some substances are as follows:- Water 1.0, Quartz 2.6, gold 19.0. All you need for this is any accurate set of scales and a container of water, plus some cotton or fishing line to suspend the specimen in the water. First of all weigh the specimen in air (WA), then weigh it in the water suspended on the cotton, care being taken not to let the specimen to touch the sides or bottom of the container (WW). The formula for calculating the specific gravity is as follows:- SG = WA/WA-WW. For example if the specimen weighs 36 grams in air and 24 grams in water, and applying the formula, 36/36-24 = 36/12 = 3.0 If the SG is 3.0, using the table below which shows the % weight of gold in quartz, there is 15 45% of the 36gm specimen having 5.56gm of gold. Although quite accurate. If the gold is in ironstone or other rock a different table
  - 4:- For this method, a formula has been calculated for a quartz specimen using 3.1 x the weight of the specimen in water minus 1.9 the weight in air. Using the example above, 3.1 x 24 1.9 x 36 = 74.4 68.4 = 6.0 gm (very close to the above method)

would have to be calculated.
