

Being situated so close to civilization, many of us took the opportunity to head into town



#### Remember to be considerate of others if you feel that you must use a generator

Don't use it close to other campers, take measures to mitigate the sound such as put it in a ditch or use a sound baffle, don't run it all day, and observe the 9:00 pm cut off time

## **The Poseidon Nugget**

The Poseidon nugget was found on the 18th of December 1906 by Samuel Woodall and was named after the 1906 Melbourne Cup winner "Poseidon"

The nugget was 29.6 kilograms, or 953 troy ounces of gold and found only a couple of feet down in shallow ground at the head of what became the Poseidon Lead in Newbridge, Central Victoria.

The whole area was rushed and it became the world's richest shallow alluvial lead, with thousands of ounces in small and large nuggets being found over hundreds of metres as the lead got deeper. The adjacent Woolshed Reef had been worked 50 years before this and the lead had been totally missed until someone got a hand auger and tested the depth across the slope and found the hidden deeper ground.


Fortunately, many photos of the diggings, the miners and the nuggets were taken over the next few years.

PMAV member Tim Brown is the great-grandson of Samuel Woodall and lives in Castlemaine and is still actively prospecting.

Editor's note: I pegged this area in 1990, Claim Number 2973 Min 5139 and worked the area with my wife Rita Bentley, on and off for several years with a dozer and excavator. We only found a couple of ounces as the area had been too rich and every single bit of the shallow ground had been carefully gone through by the original miners. There is probably still a lot of gold in the deeper parts of the lead which goes for kilometres.
